Alpha Delta Phi Captures Fraternity Hockey Championship!

Having lost in the quarterfinals and semifinals in the previous two hockey seasons, Alpha Delt was out to make a statement on the ice last winter. After notching a perfect 3-0 record through our round-robin divisional games, we were seeded fourth of 12 fraternities heading into the postseason. We squared off on March 13 against the fifth-seeded Phi Sigma Kappa in the quarterfinals and easily advanced with an 8-1 victory.

Coming back from the spring break refreshed and re-energized we were faced with the first-seeded Chi Psi, our toughest opponent to date. We got on the board late in the first period with a goal by Scott Marrett '08, but Chi Psi evened the score just a minute later. The clock continued to tick down as the two evenly matched teams battled it out.

Regulation time expired with the score still knotted at 1-1. A five-minute overtime began and Chi Psi came inches from winning the game on a wide-open 2-on-1 opportunity. Overtime ended with the scoreboard still 1-1. We

won the coin toss and opted to shoot first in the sudden death three-man shootout. Both teams scored with their first shooter before it turned into a battle of the goaltenders. The next five shooters on each team failed to score. Finally, Jordan Wells '07 broke the tie on a miraculous effort with a shot through the legs of the Chi Psi goaltender. A blocker save by Patrick Kavanagh '07 stymied the final Chi Psi shooter and the entire bench stormed the ice to celebrate!

Our final obstacle was the Delta Chi team the following night. They proved, however, to be no great challenge as we proceeded to utterly dismantle them, 6-1, and capture the 2006-2007 Intramural Fraternity Hockey Championship!

Congratulations to all the players on their tremendous effort leading to the first intramural championship in recent memory.

Our championship trophy will be proudly stored in the archives for years to come!

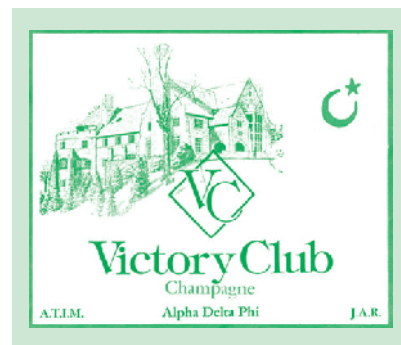
Phenomenal Social Growth Seen at The Phi

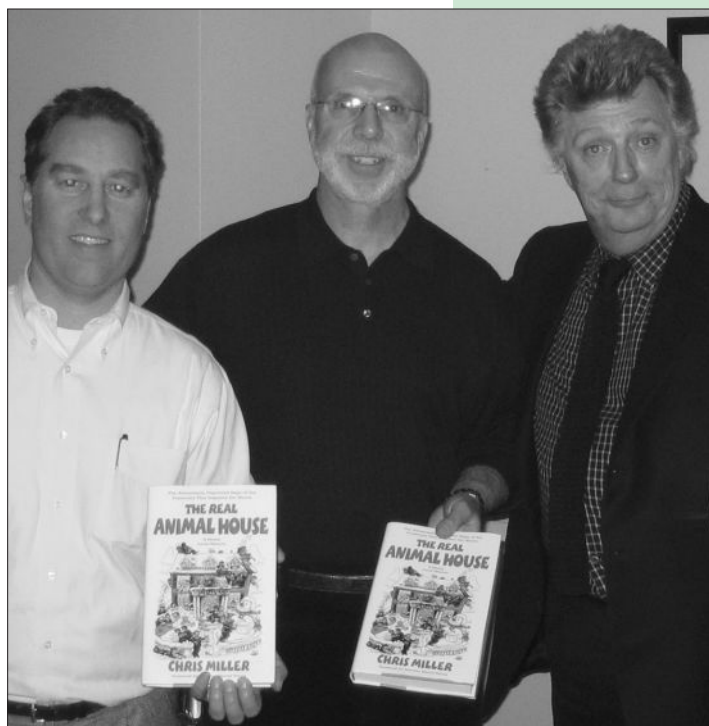

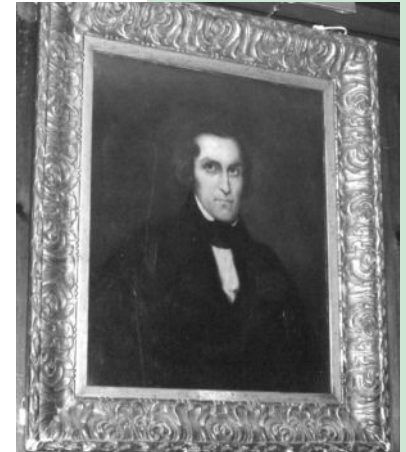

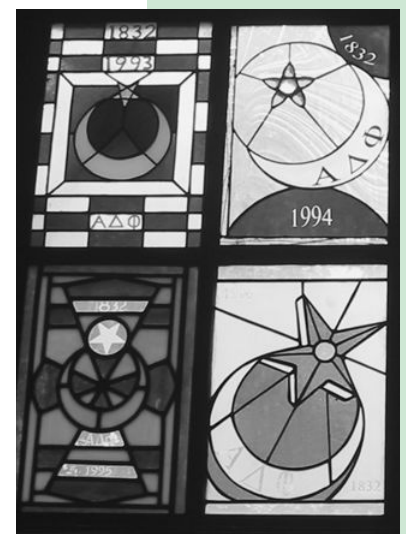

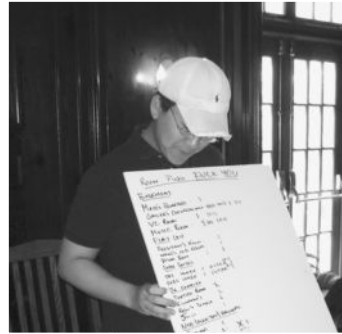

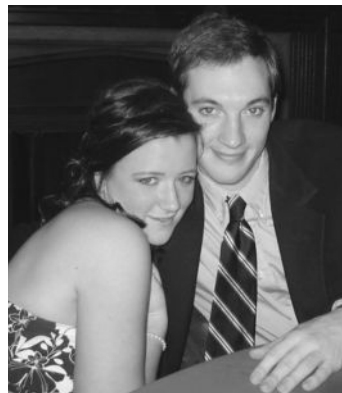

We Belong At Alpha Delta Phi

The following excerpt is from a letter dated April 26, 1983, from Thomas M. Bower '73 to Nathaniel L. Bowditch '83. In the letter, Brother Bower praises and critiques the operation and execution of the spring Initiation weekend. Toward the end of the lengthy discourse, Brother Bower describes some ideas and feelings that I am certain many alumni share about the complicated emotions involved in returning to the Phi. Our thanks to Brother Bower for capturing a set of alumni feelings that are evergreen, powerful, and as true today as they were, nearly 25 years ago.

You must understand that alumni come back to the house, perhaps after an absence of several years, with very mixed emotions. On the one hand, we all feel very much like we are coming home after a long absence and that we “belong” in Ithaca, at Cornell, and in Alpha Delt. I assure you that none of us would go up there if we did not love the place. On the other hand, we feel like interlopers and supernumeraries, especially when we see other people living in “our” rooms and other cars parked in “our” parking spaces. You cannot begin to understand the mix of emotions in the hearts of the alumni until you experience it yourself in the near future. Against this background, it is easy to understand that the alumni want to be made to feel welcome, needed, and appreciated.

When I was an undergrad, it was unthinkable that an alumnus would walk into the Great Hall and be studiously ignored by a group of nearly a dozen assembled brothers. It was taken for granted that any visiting alumnus would be greeted as a long lost brother, offered the run of the house, provided with an escort, plied with liquor, and courted by a clique of sycophantic undergrads. In short, an alumnus was someone to be treated as an honored guest rather than an inconvenience.

Now neither I nor any of the other alumni are going to live or die depending on whether the cocktail hour is opened early, the House is clean and neat, or the brothers friendly and hospitable. These things are not so much important in and of themselves, but as indirect ways of expressing welcome to guests.

Having graduated not so long ago, I recall quite clearly that I never wanted to take the trouble to be courteous, hospitable, and actively friendly to visiting alumni. Nonetheless, we made an effort to befriend and entertain them whenever they came back to Alpha Delt, whether we enjoyed it or not. I know now that they must have appreciated our efforts and, in retrospect, am pleased that we took the trouble. Go thou and do likewise.

Public Service Internship Program Award Winner Announced

We have concluded a very successful Adelpic Cornell Educational Fund (ACEF) Public Service Internship Program selection process. We received eight outstanding applications for the ACEF award this year, so the selection of one deserving candidate was very difficult. We even received two applications from freshmen, and encouraged them to consider applying again in the future, so the word is getting out about this great opportunity. While the organization sponsored will be the same, Harlem RBI, the student is a great fit for the purposes set forth for this award.

I am very excited to announce your 2007 ACEF Public Service Intern: Simon Hammer '09. Simon is a sophomore from Bedford Hills, New York, attending Cornell's College of Human Ecology and majoring in Human Biology, Health, and Society. He is a leader and a team player, through his involvement as philanthropy chair for Phi Kappa Psi and a member of the Cornell Varsity Swimming team. Simon plans a career in health care or medicine. This internship will enhance his communication skills and allow him to learn about the various factors affecting the environment in the lives of these youth from a variety of backgrounds, and their effects on their well being. He looks forward to helping to shape their lives as their experiences define who they are and who they will become. He has shown dedication to community service through experience with the Durfee Tutoring Program and Relay for Life in Ithaca as well as summers working with Boys and Girls Club of Northern Westchester (for two summers), and Town of Bedford Parks and Recreation.

Simon's internship will be with Harlem RBI, a non-profit organization developed to enrich the lives of more than 600 kids in the Harlem district. Its mission is to use baseball, softball, and the power of teams to provide inner city youth with opportunities to play, to learn and to grow, inspiring them to recognize their potential and realize their dreams. Simon will assist daily with educational tutoring and classroom sessions in the morning, and participate as a co-coach in the afternoons.

REAL Kids (Reading and Enrichment Academy for Learning) is a summer program for Harlem children who want to continue to build on the literacy skills learned during the school year. Not only do the students enrich their reading and writing skills, the children build positive social and emotional characteristics. REAL Kids is dedicated to helping keep the Harlem kids off the streets and their potential involvement in gangs and drugs, into a healthy, learning and fun environment. (www.harlemrbi.org).

The 2007 ACEF candidates included: one man and six women, two freshmen; two juniors and four sophomores.

The organizations included: Cooperative Extension's Farmers' Market Nutrition Program, working with local farmers and educating low-income families on nutrition and health through outreach and cooking demonstrations at multiple farmers market locations in NYC; and Children at Risk, improving the quality of life of Greater Houston's children through strategic research, public policy analysis, education, collaboration, outreach programs and advocacy; Compos Mentis: Working Toward Wellness, offering young adults diagnosed with mental illness a place to work in community with others; The Humane Society of Rochester and Monroe County at Lollipop Farm, providing veterinary and surgical care to animals at the shelter; New Sector Alliance a nonprofit leadership development and strategy consulting firm which assists a variety of nonprofit agencies to improve their infrastructure and ultimately their services to the community;

Two other applicants also will work at Harlem RBI.

While the final choice was difficult, the selected internship will have a great impact on the student intern, the agency and the children served, as well as best meet the founding principles behind the ACEF Public Service Internship Program. This student would not be able to afford to take advantage of this amazing internship opportunity in East Harlem without the support from the ACEF Public Service Internship Program.

Cornell is proud to continue to represent a program that provides such a positive impact on a student's goal to enter public service as well as contributing to the needs of an outstanding, award-winning agency. The ACEF Public Service Internship Program Award is one of very few options for students seeking funding for these valuable career-related opportunities. Thank you again for providing this opportunity to a deserving Cornell student.

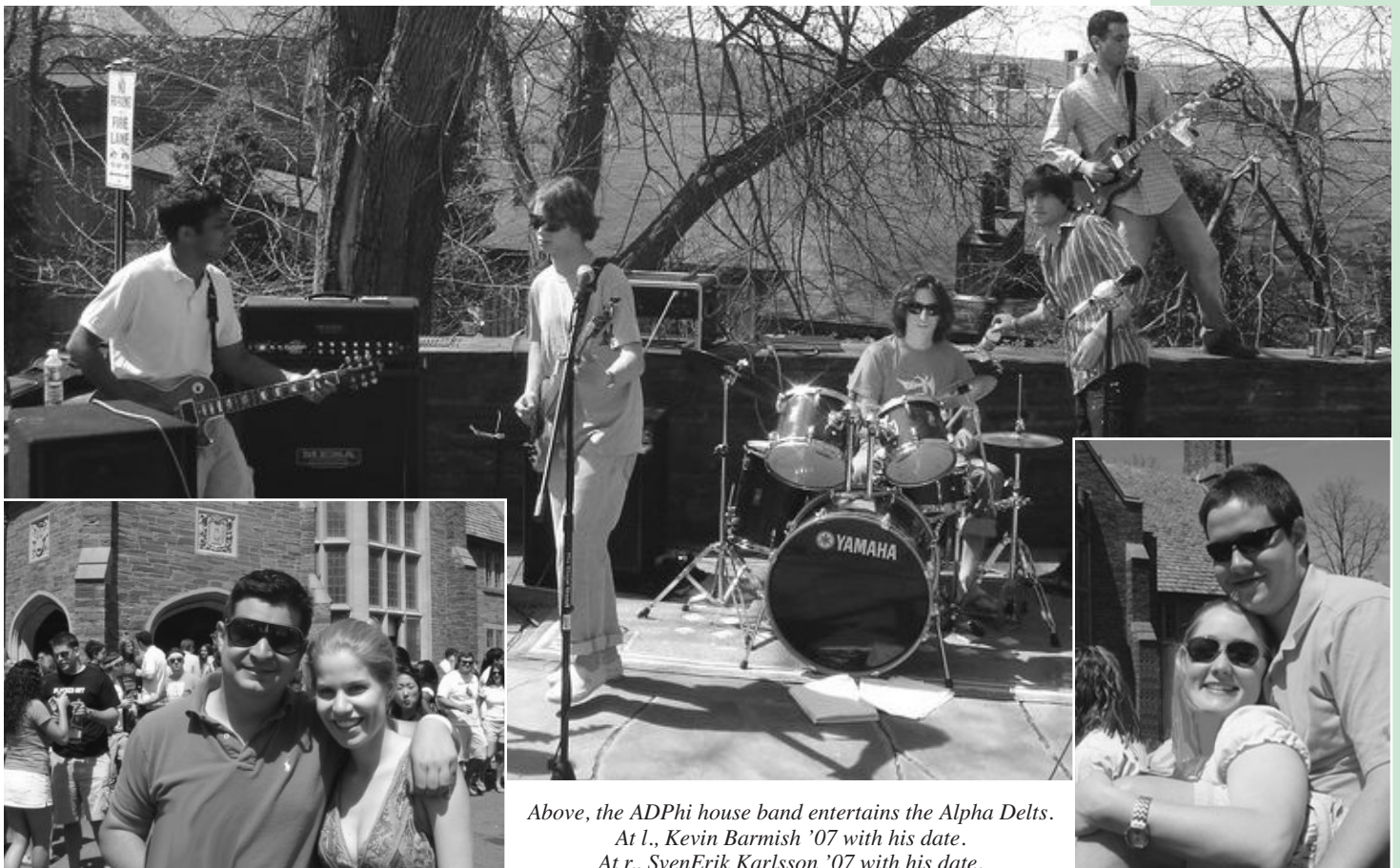

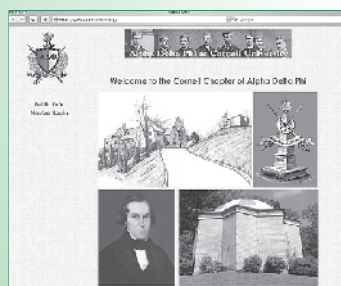
