

## Mead'77, White'95 Are Among Members Reported Deceased

CHAPTER MOURNS OTHER ALUMNI WHOSE DEATHS WERE JUST RECORDED

Alpha Delta Phi has mourned the deaths of four of its older members during the past month. Theodore Luqueer Mead '77 and Fred Rollin White '95 died during May, and the chapter has just been informed of the earlier deaths of Willis Clifford Bradley '80 and Erle Edwin Devlin '70.

Brother Mead, from whom an interesting letter was received and published in the February issue of The Alpha Delt, died May 4 in Sanford, Fla. He suffered a stroke on April 24 at his home in Oviedo and was taken within 36 hours to the hospital in Sanford. Paralysis followed and he died peacefully in his sleep in a few days later.

Was Orchid Expert

Brother Mead received the B.C.E. degree here, but remained for two additional years to study natural history. His later work in plant breeding is well preserved in horticultural records, and he earned a wide reputation for his success in growing orchids. For fifteen years he had supplied orchid seeds for botanical experiments being conducted here by Prof. Lewis Knudson.

The orchids and other plants in his collection were willed to the Royal Palm Park but may be taken over by a memorial association which will make a park of his place. The chapter is indebted to Dr. Robert T. Morris '80, Stamford, Conn., for much of the foregoing information.

#### Industrialist Dies

Brother White, chairman of the board and former president of the Baker-Raulang company, Cleveland, died May 13 at the Cleveland Clinic Hospital after a short illness. He was 64 years old. At the time of his death he was also a director of the American Ball Bearing company, the Caxton Building company and the Dynoc company.

Brother White, son of a founder of the White Sewing Machine company, graduated here in 1805. While on the Hill he was president of the chapter,

# CHARTER MEMBER WAS PRESIDENT OF NEWCOMB COLLEGE AT TULANE U.

Editor's Note: Brandt Van Blarcom Dixon '70, one of Alpha Delta Phi's oldest and youngest members, paid a surprise visit to the chapter a year ago and made a thorough inspection not only of the chapter house but also of the Hill in general.

Since that time we have hoped on several occasions that we might have Brother Dixon tell us more about the early years of the chapter. Although he declines the honor for the present in the following letter, we are publishing it anyway... as a sort of a prelude to what we hope he will contribute later! Brother Dixon is president-emeritus of Newcomb College, Tulane University, a post which he evidently gave up in order to give more time to other and more pressing affairs!

He has been chairman of the New Orleans Civic League, and has received LL.D. degrees from both Southwestern University and Tulane University. He lives in New Orleans at 1732 Palmer avenue.

#### Has Many Engagements

Your air mail letter was received last evening, and I was pleased to realize that my distance from Ithaca did not prevent being remembered, and I would gladly comply with your request if I had the time, but just now I am full up with engagements.


Colleges and schools are closing here for the summer, and, although I resigned from the Newcomb seventeen years ago, I retain my interest in all that goes on there and am constantly called on for little observances which I enjoy and hope the others do also. So this is a very busy week or two just now.

### Came From Amherst

Ed. Douglas and I were Alpha Delts in Amherst College and come to Cornell in December 1870. There we met a number of others, among them Sam Halliday and Johnson Brigham, and during the winter organized the Cornell chapter, and obtained a charter.

We held our meetings in rented rooms, sang our songs, and had occasional instrumental performances by the members, which we, ignorant of good music, thought very fine indeed. And, after the meetings there was the walk up Buffalo hill, for most of us. But we had already learned to take that in as a part of the curriculum.

When I visited the university last summer I tried Buffalo hill again, to see how it would go. It went and I went—nearly.

#### Had Life Adventure

I amuse myself once in a while, in recalling a little adventure a few of us had on the lake, but it was not funny at the time. We hired a cat boat and sailed down with a fair wind, but it soon developed that none of us knew much about sailing. Six or eight miles out a sharp squall met us, upset the boat before we could down the sail and drove us to the east shore clinging to the overturned boat. When we reached shallow water we managed to roll the boat over, bailed out, sundried it and ourselves, sailed innocently back, and agreed to say nothing, but it leaked out and the joke was on us, plenty!

#### Lectures Occasionally

If you are really interested in knowing further about me, there is a little book in the Cornell library, "A Brief History of H. Sophie Newcomb Memorial College" which is a reminiscence of my work here. I still am interested in educational work, lecture occasionally but don't write. You will have observed that I am but a poor typist so kindly excuse any blunders.
