Three Alpha Delts Lost by Chapter In Recent Months

Palmer '78, Wigglesworth '22, Young '93 Are Brothers Mourned by Chapter

The chapter has learned of the death of three alumni members within recent months.

Lynde Palmer '78 died suddenly at his home in Plattsburg, N. Y., November 19. Previous to his retirement in 1929, Brother Palmer had been sales representative in the east of the St. Paul and Tacoma Lumber company, and had also been associated with their manufacturing operations in Washington.

On War Industries Board

During the war, he served on the War Industries board, having charge of purchases by the Allies and the U. S. government of Douglas fir and airplane spruce. Earlier business ventures included a four-year partnership in the cattle business, and a partnership in another lumber company.

Brother Palmer was a member of both the freshman and varsity crews on the Hill, his oar hanging over the fireplace in the old house for many years previous to the fire.

William Young '93

William Young '93 died in Williamsport, June 14, the chapter has learned only recently. Before retiring in 1934, he had been Judge of the Children's court in New York City for nine years. His public career started with three terms in the New York State Assembly in 1905-06-07. This was followed by 16 years on the New York Municipal court bench.

He was a member of both the freshman and the varsity crews, and played varsity football in '92. In addition to his wife and two children, he is survived by four Alpha Delt brothers, Edwin P. Young '94, John P. Young '94, Charles V. P. Young '99, and George H. Young '00, as well as three sisters.

Francis D. Gamewell '79 Served in China 49 Years

Living quietly at 4700 Pine street, Philadelphia, Pa., is Francis D. Gamewell '79, who retired in 1930 after 49 years of active missionary service in China.

He was enrolled as a civil engineering student on the Hill but transferred to Dickinson, where he received his A.B., A.M., and Ph.D. In 1881, he entered educational work in Peking, China, and three years later, was made superintendent of the West China Mission.

In 1889, he became professor of chemistry and physics at Peking University, and held this position until 1900. Thus he was in China during the Boxer Rebellion, and was in charge of the fortifications of the British legation.

The following years found him holding many important positions in the missionary field of the Methodist Episcopal church. He was also named a trustee of Yenching University, Peping, China.
