Rush-Rule Changes Make Problem Greater

Need for Summer Rushing Is Greater than Ever

While there is no question in our minds that fraternity rushing is always a major project for the chapter, the project this year may easily be regarded as a major problem for two principal reasons.

First of all, as you realize, we need to pledge more men to fill gaps in our ranks because of calls to service and positions in defense industries. Coupled with this difficulty is a new set of rushing rules for the fall which tend to take some of the pressure off rushees, but make it more difficult for fraternities.

The chief change, as far as we are concerned, is that freshmen may not be pledged in person by a fraternity man. He may be offered a formal bid, on and after the second Tuesday night of school, but a rushee may pledge a house only by presenting his bid to Willard Straight desk and announcing his decision.

While this is excellent in theory, we have the feeling it may encourage freshmen to delay pledging (just as you might delay buying life insurance until someone kept after you to do it), and this seems to be a year when fraternities need help rather than hindrance to their rushing problem.

This is a long way 'round to ask you to be on the alert more than ever this year to dig up rushing prospects for the chapter, and to send in those names early in the summer so we may make many contacts during the summer months.

Alumni to Vote on Change Of Corporation Meeting Date

As set forth in Article 9 of the Constitution, you are hereby notified that action will be taken on the motion, Saturday at 10:00 a.m., June 14, 1941, at the chapter house, to change Article 5, Section 1, to read: The regular meetings of this Corporation shall be held annually at Ithaca, N. Y., at the time of the annual chapter initiation at the chapter house.

A vote of three-fourths of the members present at the regular meeting is required to change the Constitution.

New University Golf Course Is Challenge to Us Duffers

Cornell finally has its own golf course—a nine-hole layout just across Kline Road from the Country Club course, with the first tee close to the broadcasting towers of WHCU.

The course was designed by Robert T. Jones, Cornell '31, member of DKE, and was opened this spring. It is of championship calibre, one that calls for the use of nearly every club in the bag. Tees are long and adjustable which gives the course flexibility in length. Some 20 carloads of white sand provide many (too many!) traps, and the greens are well-guarded and rolling.

Membership is limited to students during regular session, and to students, faculty and administration during the summer. Fees are five dollars per term for students, \$15 for a summer membership. If this first nine proves successful, a second nine will be completed (if and when the funds are available.)


