New Pledge Class of 18 Freshmen Shows Excellent Promise

\$20,000 Mark Is Reached In Refinancing Campaign

The Refinancing plan which was adopted by the Trustees at the spring meeting is already nearing the \$20,000 mark. This is a great reduction in the principal, and the Ithaca Savings Bank has received a substantial payment.

The plan was adopted because it was impossible for the Corporation, through the resident chapter, to make any principal reduction. Interest and taxes are current and always have been, but these two items are so large there is little likelihood the chapter could ever pay the principal. In adopting the plan the Trustees studied all of its phases, as well as getting reports from other houses at Cornell which have used the plan successfully.

During the past few months folders have been sent to most alumni, and in some instances, personal calls have been made. *Paul Rice '25* of Trumansburg, N. Y., is treasurer of the Trustees.

We have formed a "Thousand Dollar and Over" club, and to date there are five members—Young '94. Johnson '06, Distler '12, Hooker '21, Machlett '22. Many others have subscribed lesser amounts. It is hoped that every alumnus will consider investing money in the mortgage and likewise make a good investment for himself.

The plan provides that alumni subscribe to a fund making their payments over a five-year period. This fund will purchase the mortgage from the Ithaca Savings Bank. Instead of receiving interest from this fund the Alumni corporation will apply to the Columbian National Life Insurance Co. for \$150 of 35 year endowment insurance for each \$100 in vested by the individual. 
