Dr. Edmund Ezra Day Named As Cornell Head

Dr. Edmund Ezra Day, director for the social sciences of the Rockefeller Foundation, was elected the fifth president of Cornell by the Board of Trustees November 7. He will succeed President Livingston Farrand who retires in June.

Dr. Day received his BS from Dartmouth in 1905, his MA the following year, and his PhD from Harvard in 1909. In 1931, the University of Vermont conferred on him the degree of Doctor of Laws.

He taught economics at Dartmouth and Harvard, and in 1923 went to the University of Michigan, and became the first Dean of the School of Business Administration. Since 1927, he has been associated with the Laura Spelman Rockefeller Memorial and the Rockefeller Foundation.


PLAN WINTER I.M. TEAMS

Shiverick, Famed Athlete Twenty Years Ago, Dies

Francis T. Shiverick '18, one of Alpha Delta Phi's most famous alumni, died at his home at 200 N. Michigan avenue, Chicago, October 25, 1936. At the time of his death, he was associated with his brother in the Tobey Furniture company.

Brother Shiverick played on the undefeated 1915 Big Red football team, and was the outstanding kicker and ground-gainer of that combination. This team gave Harvard its first defeat since 1911.

The next season he kicked the field goal which won the Michigan game 23-20. He left school in 1917 to enlist in the army and saw service in France as a captain in the Provost Marshall General's department.

He returned to the Hill in 1919 and as captain of the 1920 team, led the squad through another splendid season, personally scoring all nine points as civil engineer.
