Edgar Queeney '19 Chemical Co. Head, Is N.A.M. Director

Company He Directs Receives Industrial Engineering Award

Another honor has been made to Edgar M. Queeny '19, one of Cornell's outstanding Alpha Delts. His latest honor is re-election to directorship in the National Association of Manufacturers.

A recent issue of the New York Sun carried a lengthy article concerning the appointments and re-elections of N. M. A. directors. Brother Queeny's picture accompanied the story as one of the foremost men in the association, and as a successful manufacturer.

Heads Chemical Company

This well-known business man is more prominently associated with the Monsanto Chemical Co., Columbia, Tenn., of which he is president. The Monsanto Co. has been recently publicized for its accomplishment of producing pure Phosphorus.

It has long been known that phosphorus is a substance with almost unlimited possibilities for usefulness in chemical processes but it was a very difficult substance to handle. It was necessary to keep it always under water to prevent it from bursting into flame spontaneously.

Company Receives Award

Methods for producing it in an electric furnace directly from phosphate rock were worked out on a small scale at the laboratory at Annison, Ala., and it is now being produced in enormous quantities as a heavy chemical in Tennessee.

For its accomplishment in bringing about this development of the element in a phosphoric acid form, the Monsanto Chemical Co. this month received the award of Chemical and Industrial Engineering "in recognition of its meritorious contribution to the advance of the industry and profession, made possible through a broader participation by the chemical engineer in the affairs of the process industries."

The company spends nearly a million dollars a year on research. That is 16 per cent of its net income, and three per cent of its net sales.
