Eddison '42 Writes About Summer Trip Aboard Polish Liner

War Declared While Ship Was Crossing The Atlantic

"We were delighted when the M. S. Batory of the Gdynia-America Line docked in Copenhagen on schedule, for we had some apprehension of getting home. It was the 25th of August and we had already booked passage for New York on this Polish ship.

"We boarded her, and she set sail first for Cherbourg. The North Sea looked serene and quite touched by European tension; we were reminded of the state of affairs, however, when we learned we had gone about 200 miles off course to avoid unnecessary proximity to German waters.

Experienced Blackout

"We also had our first blackout that first night out. The massive blackness of the ship reminded us of the death ship in Outward Bound. The blackout was practically ineffectual, however, since there was a bright moon, making us visible for miles.

"The following morning we arrived in Cherbourg. Only a few of the many thousand American refugees chose to board the *Batory* and travel home on board a Polish ship. The following morning we left Cherbourg, and on our sixth day out from Copenhagen, Germany declared war on Poland. If the conflict had officially begun on or before the fifth day we would have had to return immediately to the nearest European port.

Atlantic Passage Rough

"The Atlantic passage was so rough there was no fear of submarine attack. On the morning of the eighth day we sighted land ahead, although at that time we had expected to be one thousand miles from New York. We learned from



the crew that we were coming into St. Johns, Newfoundland, where there was the protection of British guns (those captured from the French in the eighteenth century, we discovered, were the only guns there) until a convoy arrived.

"We stopped at Halisax the next day and here saw for the first time cur convoy of cruisers, and also learned that France and England had entered the war. We could not help rejoicing with our Polish hosts.

"We left Halifax under cover of night and headed at full speed for New York. The only lights to be seen on the upper part of the ship were the flickering of flashlights in the main smoking room where drinks were being served, and the golden spray of carbon particles which rose from the roaring funnel aft.

"We were in New York quarantine on the morning of September 5. In the harbor we could see the Monarch of Bermuda and the Queen Mary in sombre wartime dress. Two seamen from our ship jumped overboard in an attempt to desert. We, too, wondered about the destiny of the Batory."

Quentin Booth '81 Passes; Was Former Manufacturer

A death notice reaching the attention of the chapter belatedly concerns Quentin Woodbury Booth '81 who passed away January 9, 1939, in Rochester where he lived at 272 Culver Road. He was a brother of Irving E. Booth '83 also of Rochester.

Deceased was a member of the firm of Booth Brothers, machinery manufacturers, until his retirement in 1931. He entered Sibley College from Rochester in 1877, studying at Cornell one year. He was single.

Shurman Appointed Judge Of New York City Court

The December 19, 1939, New York Herald Tribune carried a picture of Jacob Gould Schurman, Jr. 17 being sworn in as judge of the Court of General Sessions. He was formerly New York City Chief Magistrate.

Brother Schurman was appointed to the new position by Governor Herbert H. Lehman to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the former judge. He will hold the office until December 31, 1940, at which time the position will be filled by a special election of November.

The new judge, a Republican, was defeated in this year's election for a place on the General Session's bench. He had the Governor's endorsement in the primary.

The son of the late Dr. Jacob Gould Schurman, former Cornell president, he was graduated from Harvard Law School in 1922 and engaged in private practice until his appointment by New York's Mayor F. H. LaGuardia as Chief Magistrate in 1935.

We address him at 300 Mulberry Street in New York where his family consists of Mrs. Schurman, Polly 9, Lydia 11, and John R. 15. John is attending Phillips Exeter Academy. All but son John were present at the swearing-in ceremonies which took place in the Appellate Division Courthouse on December 18. Judge Schurman took his seat on the bench Deiember 20th.
