Canadian Resident Tells of Life in a Country At War; Spirit and Cooperation Are Remarkable

One rather unexpected development in the house has been an increase in the number of foreign students. Now there are three: Eduardo Ricaurte from Buenos Aires; Julio "Nick" Cadenas from Havana, Cuba; and the writer. As someone remarked the other day, we are almost running a Cosmopolitan Club.

Although my "permanent" address has always been Montreal, Quebec, I have hardly been there three weeks out of the 52 in the last five years. Living so much in the U.S. I had come to feel almost more of an American than a Canadian. But that is past.

Made Aware of Nationality

One of the first effects of the war was to make everyone aware of his nationality. Everyone has been classified and segregated. And the border between the countries has become much harder to cross. For Canadians to get out of Canada involves enough red tape to tie down even a customs official.

Many people have asked me what the feeling is in Canada regarding the war. Perhaps the best way to describe it is "determined optimism". Certainly no one up there is blinding himself to the possibilities of disaster, but everyone intends to do everything possible to avert it. The cooperation is remarkable.

Profits May Mean Nothing

While industries welcome the business which keeps them going at full capacity, 24 hours a day, they recognize that the profits they are making now may mean less than nothing in a year or two. No one crows over a rising sales curve. In a fight like this private ambitions are given second place.

Perhaps indicative of the sentiment is the fact that when the second war

All good Republicans can imagine that *Charles B. Goodspeed 'o8* is a busy man these weeks as treasurer of the National Republican Committee; and particularly so since the Hatch Act has given each party cause to watch the tactics of their opponents as well as to keep things legal in the home office. loan was launched in September, \$300,000,000 was subscriped in less than ten days. Considering that Canada is a country of only 11,000,000 people, it is obvious that the will-towin is there. More directly affecting the people at large, however, are the increased taxes. The National Defense tax of 3% on incomes over \$1,200: a 70\% tax on new automobiles; a 50% tax on liquor; municipal, provincial and federal taxes on everything that can conceivably be considered luxury—all make living more expensive than ever.

Everyone Over 16 Registered

Many of the companies have given their employees a 10% increase in salaries to take care of this, but many of them have also cancelled all vacations. Still, nobody complains, or at least not much.

On August 16, last, everybody over 16, except convicts and cloistered nuns, registered. In five days some 7,000,000 people filled out blanks giving their life history and abilities. One of the chief questions was; "Can you milk a cow?" It was the first step toward the draft.

In September all single men of 21 and 22 took a medical examination for the army; those who passed will be required to take six weeks training for Home Defense. As yet there has been no draft for active service. All Canadians overseas are volunteers.

Old School Friends in Action

There are a great many volunteers. The war comes considerably closer home when one boy I went to school with helped destroy. Dunquerque after the evacuations; another was killed in a bombing raid; and a third received the Distinguished Flying Cross. The army has entered everyone's life. I expect to take training next summer; my brother-in-law has join-
