One-Third Refinancing Goal Is Subscribed By 40 Alumni Members

Refinancing Committee Is Anxious to Push Drive To Early Completion

At the present time 40 Alpha Delts—one-tenth of the living alumni—have subscribed to the mortgage refinancing fund. This one-tenth has subscribed to about one-third of the total amount needed to completely refinance the debt.

Much time has been donated by loyal members in writing and personally contacting other members and friends. The above report, while entirely encouraging, does point out that we are not getting the support from a large enough percentage of our alumni. In the last *Alpha Delt* it was pointed out that each member's share of the debt was \$200. While we know it is impossible to get everyone to do his part, we feel many more can make an investment of \$5 a month when their estate is increased by 50 per cent with each payment

Many younger men have participated in the program. The class of '25 still leads in the number of subscribers. As against this we find classes with no representatives. Isn't there someone in the classes of '10, '17, '20 '26, '33, '34, '36, '38 who feels he can make an investment in the program?

May we make an appeal to all those who have not done so to write *Paul K. Rice*, Trumansburg, N. Y., and signify their intention of helping at least to the extent of \$5 a month. Remember, this is an investment, and at the same time helps refinance the mortgage.

Alden Sherry Defends Cornell's War Efforts Thru The Daily Sun

Some weeks ago the Cornell Sun carried an article on the editorial page by one of the underlings on the news board to the effect that Cornell was decidedly lax in providing opportunity for students to prepare for the war effort. The writer extolled Princeton as doing an especially fine job in this respect in contrast to "backward" Cornell.

The following day a lengthy letter appeared on the same page, and was signed Alden Sherry '16. As a former army man, and pilot in World War I, he comes in contact with the Civil ian Pilot Training program at Syracuse, and somewhat at Cornell. He happened to read the Sun's denunciation of Cornell's efforts, and proceded to disprove it by presenting facts about the scope of the program up here, and that Cornell's CPT was started before most Eastern schools, and that it heads the list in the number of graduates.

He pointed out that Cornell does provide the opportunities, but they aren't "spoon-fed" — that it is very much up to the student to avail himself of those opportunities. Brother Sherry is president of Morris Plan Industrial Bank of Syracuse, and we very much enjoyed reading his comments.


