

Resumption of Annual Alpha Delta Phi Conventions Held in Ann Arbor in August

Meeting in Ann Arbor, Michigan, the 111th-114th Convention of The Alpha Delta Phi was held from August 3 to August 5, 1946. This meeting marked the resumption of the annual convention policy, and included within itself all business arising during the war years when no conventions were held. Each of the twenty-seven chapters of the fraternity were well-represented by both actives and alumni.

The delegates from the Cornell Chapter were Alexander W. Dann, Jr. '45, Hilary H. Micou, Jr. '46, and Ralph C. Ware '48. Present among the alumni were Bob Hargreaves '09, Bob Vinton '39, Herb Micou '15, and Ben Micou '16.

Discussions were held during the convention on the following major issues:

(1) A proposal that steps be taken to increase the number of chapters of Alpha Delta Phi. Present active chapters were advised to investigate universities where new chapters might be established. Two universities suggested for this area were Pennsylvania and Lehigh. Proposed universities would be passed on by the two nearest active chapters, then, after basic organizational ground work was completed, the proposal would be placed before the next Convention for ratification.

(2) It was found that large variation in initiation procedures existed among the chapters. Steps were taken to unify the existing procedures into one standard form.

(3) The new officers of the National Executive Council were elected to replace the retiring officers. They are: President—Richard L. Greene, Rochester '25; Vice-president—Colin W. G. Gibson, Toronto '15; and Secretary—Henry A. Perkins, Yale '96.

(4) Eric T. King, Jr., Union '42, was appointed traveling secretary for the Executive Council.

(5) Re-establishment of the chapters made virtually inactive by the war remained the main objective of the Convention. The major part of

With the war interrupting his schooling, he served as a captain in the ETO, but now he has entered as a freshman. Jim shows great promise as a crewman. Another crewman is David Lee Brooke of Oak Park, Ill. A high school athlete Dave won three varsity soccer letters and was very active in the student council and debating club. Roger Brown, Niagara Falls, prior to his entrance to the university, had just received his discharge from the Navy. The senior, C. Daniel Cornwell, was in the Navy and operated a radio station in the Hawaiian Islands during the war. From Cedar Rapids, Iowa, Dan was valedictorian of his class in high school and has maintained his good work at Cornell.
