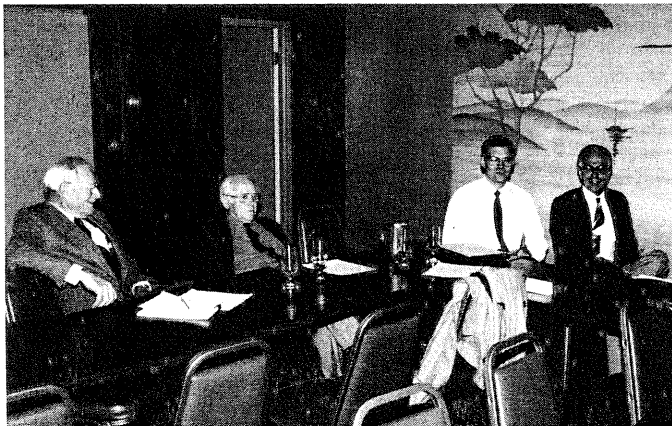
Alumni Pledge \$122,870 To ACEF In Eight Months

The Adelpic Cornell Educational Fund has responded to the 1986 graduating class challenge! As you may recall, last year's Cornell Alpha Delt seniors pledged a record \$57,450 to the Adelpic Fund. This was intended as a challenge to the Alpha Delt alumni, and those alumni brothers have met the challenge!

To date, \$65,420 has been pledged by alumni from earlier classes to make a total of \$122,870 designated to the fund in 1986. A number of alumni have pledged gifts of \$5,000, and one anonymous donor has issued an overall challenge gift of 10 percent of all monies that are raised over the next five years.

Lauri Walsh '61 has been elected campaign director. As a way to spread the word about current activities at the Alpha Delt house on the hill, Lauri has been organizing a series of dinners at cities across the country. A dinner was held in San Francisco on October 6 with 20 brothers and friends attending. The next dinner is scheduled for Boston on December 8.

Chapter Continues Solicitations For Employment Network

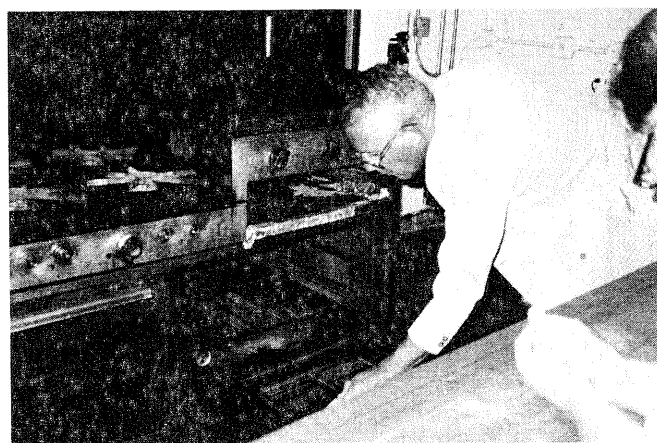

House Receives Maintenance Work

Your alumni corporation, under the guidance of several key graduates, took a major step in catching up on several years of deferred maintenance to the chapter house. Over 1,900 hours of carefully planned effort went into repairs to the bathrooms, exterior stonework, second-floor rooms, and the kitchen. Special thanks go to David L. Brooke '55, whose six-page detailed report on kitchen deficiencies was implemented after careful consideration and thorough follow-up. We have complied by 90 percent with a four-page inspection report by Cornell Public Safety on code violations. Unfunded projects include an electronic smoke alarm system in each room, a dormer in the third-floor windowless room, and the completion of the exterior lexan on all windows.

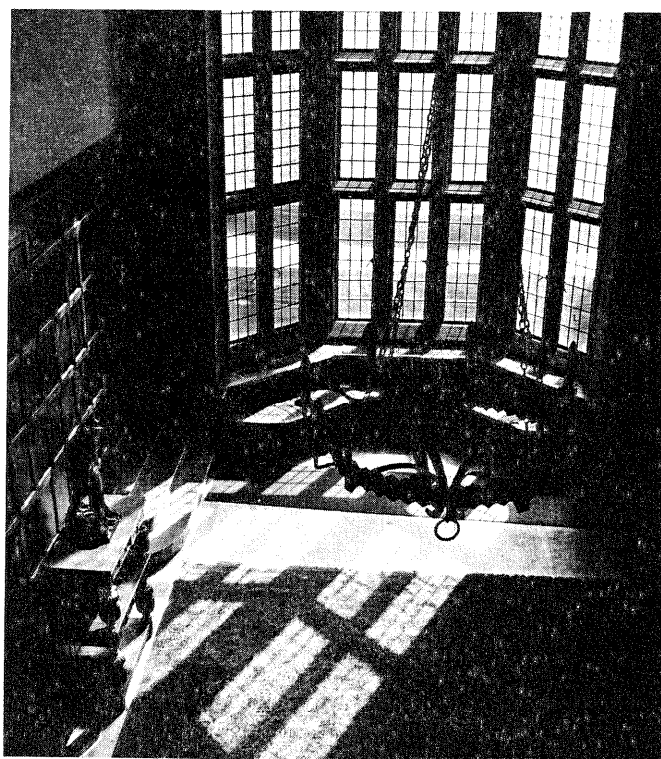

Well-Run Programs Make Alpha Delta Phi Leading Fraternity

This fall Alpha Delt has emerged as the leading fraternity at Cornell. Our financial strength and heightened sense of brotherhood have made my term as president a job to enjoy. All the officers have worked and communicated well together, enabling the house to sponsor better functions and create superior living conditions.

Thanks to Pete Wolfe '87, who unexpectedly entered the office of treasurer when he returned this fall, the house is operating under budget for the fall semester. There are three main reasons why he accomplished this: tight fiscal control of the officers who make large expenditures, such as steward and social chairman; a continuation of last year's aggressive policy of pursuing house rentals (almost \$3,000 of extra rental income this semester alone); and 37 people living in the house this semester. To ensure the long-term financial stability of the house, we must rely on a strong rush program. This year's rush chairman, Mike Millette '87, and his assistant, Eric Hoerdtorfer '88, have done a magnificent job in streamlining and updating the Alpha Delta Phi rush program, creating an "efficient formula" that can be easily duplicated year after year. The Alpha Delt social program has been extremely successful this semester. The emphasis has been on smaller functions with sororities, where the service of alcoholic beverages is closely monitored in compliance with new state laws. This eliminates the prospect of any potential liability problems. We have, however, successfully kept the tradition of Alpha Delta Phi "bar parties," but with an added novel twist. After much consulting with Janiece Oblak, assistant dean of students for fraternities and sororities, Social Chairman Joe Givler '88 ran these functions with a bar serving alcoholic beverages downstairs and on the main floor a bar serving "mocktails" for those under the legal drinking age. The "mocktails" became an instant success, and Janiece Oblak, after having her assistant observe our first two bar parties, complimented Alpha Delt for throwing successful functions while enforcing and going beyond the requirements of the new university alcohol policies. She will be using Alpha Delta Phi as her "premier" example when working with fraternities



and sororities on how to enforce the policies while still having a very successful function.

Thanks to summer renovations and alumnus Dave Brooke '55, who contributed much needed time, knowledge, and equipment, the kitchen is currently in the best condition it has been in for many years. These improvements—plus the advice Dave Brooke gave—has helped Steward Tom Berninger run the kitchen in a professional manner, keeping the Alpha Delta Phi meal plan the best deal on the hill.

Once again the Alpha Delta Phi is showing steady improvements in all aspects of campus life, and athletics is no exception. We have about a dozen brothers participating in a wide range of sports on the hill, from polo to rugby to track. We're currently accumulating a record number of intramural points this fall. We've recorded wins in diving, swimming, soccer, and we're undefeated in polo.

On a more serious note, Literary Chairman John Rosvear '89 has worked hard at keeping and improving the literary program. Our traditional "faculty eggnog" was quite a success because of John's diligence and the brothers' increasing enthusiasm for this event. In addition, brothers must give a literary presentation to the full brotherhood each year. Of great importance is the groundwork John has laid in sponsoring a major speaker for the spring semester. It will be difficult to outshine the Adelphic-sponsored Buckley McGovern debate of last spring, but we're making every attempt to do so. More details will be forthcoming this spring.

As a grand finale, two exceptional men have joined our ranks this fall—Michael DeLucia '87 and Jose A. Rodriguez '89. The two worked together diligently during their month of pledging. Their activities ranged from sponsoring a football, beer, and barbecue outing for the brothers at Stewart Park to completing the traditional pledge project. We welcome them to the Alpha Delta Phi and look forward to their additional enthusiasm for Alpha Delta Phi within the house. Also, special thanks to all the alumni who helped make the initiation/Homecoming Weekend a success, especially alumnus G. Lauriston Walsh '61 whose undying enthusiasm and guidance helped the undergraduate chapter become the strongest on the hill.

Homecoming: Vitality And Spirit

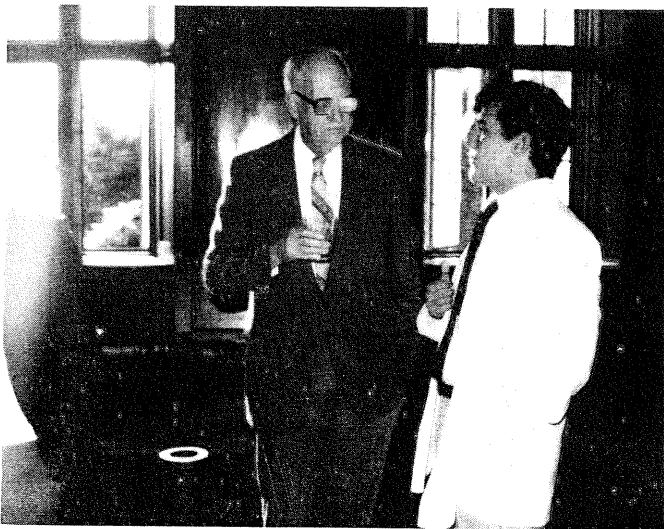

The 1879 Gamewell Pin: A New Tradition

Mrs. Victoria E. Brouwer, widow of Dr. Stephen W. Brouwer, Wisconsin '33, obtained the dress pin as a gift from Dr. Frank Gamewell, Cornell 1879, when the late Dr. Gamewell was at the Clifton Springs Hospital in 1949. Dr. Brouwer was an internist at the Clifton Springs Hospital. Dr. Gamewell had been a medical missionary in China during the Boxer Rebellion and died without any known heirs.

Mrs. Brouwer donated this beautiful pin to our alumni corporation last April. It was presented to Robert A. Engle '66, alumni corporation president, by Richard A. Wambach '54, the retiring corporation president, at the fall '86 Homecoming banquet. The pin will pass to each alumni corporation president in perpetuity as a badge of office.

Our deepest thanks and appreciation go to Mrs. Brouwer for her sensitivity and unselfishness in helping our chapter establish another "tie that binds."

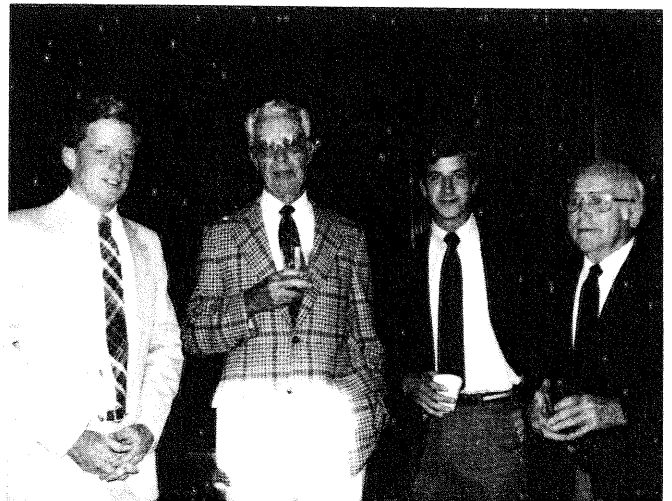
Alumnus Takes Active Role

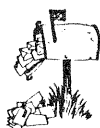
